

## THE DEDICATION OF THE ADVENT WREATH AND CANDLES

Rev. John: We do not know the full story behind the Advent Wreath. The greenery represents life now and in the future. The circle reminds us of God's unending love. The candles represent Jesus as the light of the world with the center candle being the Christ Candle. The candles remind us we

are a people of light. May these candles remind us of being Christ's light into our lives.

P: We dedicate these candles as a reminder to us and others of the uncertainty of life, as flickering candles. God helps us to be mindful of the risk in the Holy One coming into the world in the infant Jesus, born in Bethlehem.

## LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH - THE CANDLE OF HOPE

Ruth Gilbert and Nancy Roby

Reader 1: O God, we light the first candle of Advent.

Reader 2: We kindle it with hope. We long for you to come to our world, to break through and reign with compassion, justice, and peace.

Reader 1: The prophet Isaiah also cried to God to tear open heaven and come down. He called God's people to do right. Isaiah called them to be refashioned like clay by God, the potter. This Advent, we call out to God. Reader 2: Arise, shine, for your light has come and the glory of God has

risen upon you.

Congregation: For behold, darkness shall cover the earth, but God will arise upon you and his glory will be seen upon you.

ALL: And nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your rising.: Mighty God, creator of the world, break through all that keeps us from you. We ask for your mercy and reform us in your image. This Advent, visit us with your justice, love, and peace. Amen.

#### THE DEDICATION OF THE CARDS

Rev. John: Since the beginning of the Christian Church, expressions of greetings were exchanged. The early church would use a light kiss on the cheek and an embrace. Later in the 1st and 2nd centuries, Paul's letters that are now canonized into the Bible, were read aloud during worship. Paul would often use a greeting and ending for closure. Over the years, letters and cards were sent to friends and loved ones as a way of exchanging feelings and thoughts. Today, we come to sign our names to the cards for our shut-ins. The cards have been beautifully prepared by the loving hands of the Organ Society for our prayers to our friends.

P: We come with our hands before you Holy God, asking that in the name of Jesus you bless them, and us. May these messages go forth as a

symbol of our spiritual wishes and seek your Holy Spirit to strengthen our friends and families.

L: When Jesus was born in the time of King Herod, a brilliant star appeared in the east. It led magi to Bethlehem to see the infant king and offer him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

P: The star wreath reminds us of Jesus' birth.

HEART WREATH 1 John 4:7-12 Susan Attwood L: Love comes from God, and God's love became flesh in Jesus. Since God loves us, we ought to love one another. When we do, God lives in us.

# P: The heart wreath reminds us that in Jesus, God's love could be heard, seen and touched.

L: Jesus taught us to share our lives with others. In sharing his life, he was put to death on the cross and was raised to new life with God.

P: The cross wreath reminds us of Jesus' compassion, courage and resurrection.

L: The circle wreath reminds us that God's love never ends. We celebrate the eternal love of God that is with us in every place and every moment of our lives.

P: O God, thank you for this season of Advent, and these symbols of Christian faith. Help us to live out our faith in every season, with compassion and great joy.

THE DEDICATION OF THE CHRISTMAS TREE, ORNAMENTS AND LIGHTS Rev. John: As we decorate our sanctuary on December 6<sup>th</sup>, we dedicate the Christmas tree, ornaments and lights to the One who lived among us, Jesus. Some say Boniface started the tradition and others say reformer Martin Luther is the source of this tradition. It seems Germany is the source of this tradition. The first trees were often decorated with candies and cookies. Later glass blowers made ornaments. In Colonial America the Christmas Tree did not have a place. Only when the German settlers arrived did the Christmas Tree tradition begin to develop during the 1800's. We dedicate the tree, ornaments and lights to remember that Jesus is the one coming to bring us light and beauty and Jesus is God's special gift of light for everyone.

P: In thanksgiving, and praise we pre-dedicate this tree, lights and ornaments on December 6 as a reminder that God sent the Son into the world as a light, to bring beauty and hope.

#### THE DEDICATION OF THE ANGEL

Rev. John: The angel does not need an introduction. The angel is a messenger of news. The angel in our Christmas narrative brings good news. The cornhusk angels were made by the Winnebago Native American Tribe in Nebraska. We dedicate the angels to the bearer of good tidings to the world.

P: We dedicate these angels in remembering the messenger of good news and light that shines into the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it. The angels remind us of a loving God who lights our lives with Christ's message. We recognize the land where this church is gathered as the traditional territory of the Wabanaki Confederacy. We acknowledge the living histories and cultures of the Wabanaki peoples, and all Native American cultures, who have stewarded this land for generations.

#### THE DEDICATION OF THE POINSETTIA PLANT

Rev. John: The bright poinsettia has become the most popular Christmas flower. Many churches are decorated with it during the Christmas season. The poinsettia is a tropical plant. Contrary to general belief, the red leaves are not the blossoms. Rather, the small yellow flowers in the center of the clusters are the blossoms. Dr. Joel R. Poinsett first discovered the poinsettia in Mexico in 1828. The legend states that when blood fell on the earth from the broken heart of a young girl, a poinsettia grew from each drop. The starshaped formation of red leaves is a reminder to us of the star that shone over Bethlehem's stable.

## **DEDICATION OF THE NATIVITY**

Rev. John: During the Middle Ages, most people could not read and there were very few books. Church ceremonies were in Latin and worshipers did not understand all that was going on. St Francis popularized the reenactment of the birth of the Christ Child in a simple manger scene at the little town of Greccio, Italy in 1224, although the custom may have

originated as early as the 8th century. A few years before his death, Francis had seen shepherds sleeping in the fields near Greccio and this gave him the inspiration for depicting a life-size nativity so that everyone could understand the Christmas story. Tradition tells us that this took place in a cave on the hill above Greccio. Real persons playing the part of Mary, Joseph and the shepherds were accompanied by live oxen and donkeys. After the play, the actors strolled down the street singing and thus caroling was born. News spread rapidly through town and countryside, and crowds of worshipers gathered for the reenactments. This was repeated year after year and soon spread to other countries.

P: We give you thanks dear God, that Jesus came as one of us, born of working parents, and living among the poor and needy of the world. We thank you for this day and dedicate ourselves to living and telling the story of Christ to those around us so together we will know your great acts and that your love is for all people. We are thankful for the beauty of the nativity that will adorn our sanctuary as a special connection from the Whitfield Family and shared among us. Each week we will witness the movement of the Magi as they travel closer to the Manger to see Jesus.



Anglican Oxford Movement Neale translated this hymn which originated in the seven Great 'O' antiphons that were traditional for vespers during Advent. The refrain was added in the 13th century.





Georg Weissel, pastor of Altgrossgart Church in Königsberg, Prussia, based this hymn on Psalm 24. THE FIRST NOWELL verses 2 & 3

2 They looked up and saw a star shining in the east beyond them far; and to the earth it gave great light, and so it continued both day and night. Refrain: Nowell, Nowell, Nowell, Nowell, born is the King of Israel.
