

If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand wither!


Let my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth, if I do not remember you, if I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy.

and dash them against the rock!



Let Us Break Bread Together 311





Jamaican folk rhythms meet the spirit of ecumenist Fred Kaan in this 'communion calypso' hymn, first sung at the World Council of Churches Assembly in Nairobi, 1975.

Psalm 137 is challenging. Especially its violence. Its high point is the question "how shall we sing God's song in a strange land?" This is an important question: when everything is turned upside down and what shall we do now? This is the question asked by refugees, cancer patients, downsized workers, homeless persons, and bereaved spouses. This is the question congregations are asking in a post-COVID world. People ask if they have no place at the table, experiencing the alienation of the intentionally marginalized. We live in a strange land – state sponsored violence against immigrants, glaciers collapsing, presidential hate speech, escalating violence, and Christians defending dishonest leaders and denying climate change. No clear outcome is evident.

The Psalmist's query ends with thoughts of vengeance and homicide. He wants to wreak vengeance on his enemies and the enemies of his nation. He wants to kill the children – or have God kill the children – of those who have harmed him and threatened his way of life. We are not without our anger – even what we perceive righteous indignation – at false patriotism and cruelty of our leaders. We would love, in our worst moments, to annihilate perpetrators of conspiracy theories, racism, and false facts. Violence against persons are symptoms of the nation's troubled soul. But, while we cannot act on these impulses, we must admit we have them and confess our own inner turmoil and violence.

Perhaps, we can see this Psalm as an example of bringing everything to God in prayer. We can only hope that the Psalmist was cured of his violence in the course of his praying! Perhaps, he will discover that God even cares for his enemies as did an equally angry biblical character, Jonah. I did not want to read this challenging text with such blood thirsty imprecations. Even as we see God's presence in those who seek to silence us and those perpetrating injustice, we must recognize our fallibility and ask for God's peace to descend on us and the nation.

One of the most serene and spiritual moments is by the river I sit with our Ancestors both Native American and ancestors in Europe and longing for peace. Yet we all have been in the presence of grief: weeping, torment, disbelief, witnessed vindictiveness, envy, anxiety, wrath, bitterness, tears, betrayal, affliction, distress, desertion, desolation, weakness, violence, and the silence of God who appears not to save. By venting our frustrations, and pain, the Biblical writers encourage us to do the same. There's not the faintest suggestion that we should repress our questions, stifle our emotions, or resort to artificial optimism or superficial cliches. Psychologically we must do this in what call Gestalt Therapy, smack the heck and scream at a pillow and not a human being. That way they release those emotions and no one gets hurt.

We will never understand everything about the mysterious ways of God. Period. Some of the suffering we experience is inscrutable, it admits to no resolution no matter how much time, money, effort, prayer, or therapy we throw at it. In the words of Augustine (354–430), "the secrets of heaven and earth still remain hidden from us" and therefore we must "rest patiently in unknowing." So, if venting our emotions is okay, so is making peace with our ignorance.

One of my all-time favorite songs is by U2 "I Still Haven't Found what I'm Looking For." Share some of the words-

I have climbed highest mountain I have run through the fields Only to be with you I have run I have crawled I have scaled these city walls These city walls Only to be with you But I still haven't found what I'm looking for

The last verses say:

I believe in the kingdom come Then all the colors will bleed into one Well yes I'm still running You broke the bonds and you Loosed the chains Carried the cross Of my shame Of my shame You know I believed it

The song ends with four last, forlorn calls "I still haven't found what I'm looking for." That song has such appeal because much of life feels like that. Searching and feeling like what we want or need is just beyond our grasp. We

keep thinking that the right job, relationship, experience or accomplishment, self-help book will finally be the thing. Augustine understood this, the theologian who wrote the first real self-help book in his "Confessions." He came to the conclusion that most of our fruitless searching was really because we do not realize we are ultimately searching for God. Until we know that we are dissatisfied with even the good we find. Augustine believed we have a God shaped void inside, that nothing else can fill and said, "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." It is not easy to be restless. Jesus said, "Seek and you will find." But he did not say when or how long. But it is in seeking that we find growth. The last thing we need is someone pretending there is no pain, or it doesn't hurt. The good news is that when we don't have words, we can offer the gift of ourselves. And that's when the healing begins.

When a young girl returned home from school in tears, her Mother worried, and asked, "Sweetheart, what happened?" "It was awful," the girl told her Mother. "My best friend's cat died. And she was very, very sad. And I don't think I'm a good best friend, because I didn't know the right words to say, to try to help her." "What did you do?" the mother asked. "I just held her hand and cried with her all day." When we have the least answers, we are most needed. Let's make presence and attention our new currency.

I'm remembering a scene from the show West Wing. The episode when Josh is navigating Post Traumatic Stress, and life (internally and literally) for him, is on edge. Leo tells Josh this story; "This guy's walking down the street when he falls in a hole. The walls are so steep he can't get out. "A doctor passes by and the guy shouts up, 'Hey you. Can you help me out?' The doctor writes a prescription, throws it down in the hole and moves on. "Then a priest comes along and the guy shouts up, 'Father, I'm down in this hole can you help me out?' The priest writes out a prayer, throws it down in the hole and moves on. "Then a friend walks by, 'Hey, Joe, it's me, can you help me out?' And the friend jumps in the hole. Our guy says, 'Are you stupid? Now we're both down here.' The friend says, 'Yeah, but I've been down here before and I know the way out.""

Amen.
