

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# Zusammengehörigkeitsgefühl Nov. 23, 2025 Rev. John Hogue

I suspected this sermon title would turn some heads. I thought to myself, I need a title that people can remember. A title that reflects the message of stewardship. When I was in seminary, more theology came from Theologians in Germany. Names like Moltman, Schaeffer, Barth, Bonhoeffer. So there was an influx of German thinkers and thankfully in the last 20 years we have had wonderful diverse thinking in theological circles with different insights. Therefore my sermon title is the product of German theological insight- the word: Zusammengehörigkeitsgefühl. It means 'fellow-feeling of sympathy' (especially for someone in a similar situation, of similar tastes). It can also mean 'togetherness' as the 'state of being close together.' I like the word because in my understanding: means 'a sense of belonging.' We are a community of faith belonging together. As your settled Minister, the question in some people's minds is 'Where are we going? First, we will continue to work on our missions. Reach out to people, new and current members and the question: what do we have to share? I hope in the last few months you have sensed the belonging to create a community of welcoming all people and engage in a positive outlook in the midst of society that is so negative. We offer the light of hope to our community. A seed ready to sprout and offer love to the community and God.

In January, we will have our annual meeting. A budget is presented. Yes, it will be a line item budget. However, our budget is more than just a line item. There is a story behind those numbers. The story of our mission outreach. The story of energy. A story of compassion for this church reaching out into the community. We are making a difference!

A few weeks ago, at the end of October we had a Historical Vision Potluck. Those notes were shared in the weekly Chimes, I'll be happy to

resupply those notes for your discernment. I listened to what you said- We discussed what I call the Five pillars.

Pillar One: Spiritual Discussion of important Spiritual aspects of the church

Pillar Two: Structural -building, renovations that took place over the years.

**Pillar Three:** Leadership- pastors, staff, members, community
I have to say we need to thank the Larrabee's and Miss Varney who
established the endowment. We honor their ongoing legacy and anyone who
wishes to discuss legacy gifts to the church, please let me know and help
secure those wishes. Then we talked about:

Pillar Four: Mission/Outreach: Ministries, community Events. Pillar Five: Relational: conflicts, reconciliations, and celebrations.

Then we shifted to **Today our church is Strong in**......I believe these are worth repeating in your responses: Music, new organ. The Minister. Working to get jobs done. Funerals. Weekly chimes for Communication. Fellowship. Consistency of Worship.

I asked the **One Challenge we face is: Responses were:** Different types of music for the younger people to enjoy.

Diverse types of Worship. Lack of children/youth. Invite others to church. Organization of By-laws. Age and size of church. Direct outreach. Consensual Decision Making

Then I asked- 'We hope God will lead us to \_\_\_\_\_next few years.'

Willingness to change and try new things Attract more diverse members. Care for each other. Be a stronger Open and Affirming church and diversity of safe communities. Membership Growth. More involvement in the community. Working at Pilgrim Lodge.

All of these will take time and commitment, of which I am fully committed to assisting. In some cases radical hospitality can take unexpected turns. For example: At a service club luncheon when the keynote speaker sat down beside a man. The guest speaker was in such a hurry to get there he forgot to put in his dentures. Turning to the man, he whispered, "I forgot my teeth!" The man said, "No problem," reached into his briefcase, and pulled out a pair of dentures. "Try these," he said. The speaker tried them. "Too loose," he said. The man dug around again. "Here, try these." "Too tight," said the speaker. The man dug around again and said, "Here. Give this pair a try." The guest speaker smiled, saying, "They fit perfectly." He was able to eat his meal and give his speech without any trouble. As everyone was leaving, he went over to thank the man and return the spare parts. "I want to thank you for coming to my rescue," he said. "Where is your office? I've been looking for a good dentist." "Oh, I'm not a dentist," said the man. "I'm the funeral director."

I do believe in the coming year and beyond, our Ministry will influence this community, the region and beyond. We all are wanting to make a difference—to live a life of significance. Just this past week, several of you have graciously stepped up to help one of our own members. Even the smallest of congregations do big things. We are doing what we know and love.

Our scripture texts reveal the purpose of wealth is reckless generosity for a seed brings forth much more seeds and the kind that sings of the lavish love of

God. The kind that rekindles hope on dark days. The kind that reminds us that God is with us always.

Can we read our VISION statement together on the front of our bulletins? We are on a journey to reflect God's love, embracing diversity and affirming the dignity and worth of all.

Can we read our MISSION statement together?: *Together we strive to praise God, grow in faith, cultivate love, spread joy, care for all people and God's creation, promote peace, and do justice.* 

Our budget should reflect the vision and mission-driven statements. By providing glimpses of how this community of faith lives out in practical ways the broad brushstrokes of ministry. This narrative connects your story with the story of the Christian faith. I cannot wait to see how 2026 and beyond unfolds in sharing our narrative.

In Pillar five at the historical potluck, we talked about conflict and challenges this church faced. I heard about Vietnam, Open and affirming and challenges of COVID. Beloved, I heard you. However, that is the past. We need to let go and move into the future.

Furthermore, may I paint a picture of how money and ministry work together as you live out your church's mission. This is how I envision the ministry-Did you ever hear of the documentary **Accidental Courtesy: Daryl Davis. Race & America**? (2016) It is a documentary about Daryl Davis and his work with KKK members.

- Daryl Davis is a African-American musician who actively befriends members of the Ku Klux Klan, even leading to some of them leaving the Klan altogether.
- He collects their robes and hoods when they renounce the Klan.
- The documentary explores his belief that dialogue and understanding can change deeply held hate his question:

- "How can you hate me when you don't even know me?"
- It also shows tension: some Black activists (like from Black Lives Matter) disagree strongly with his approach, arguing that simply befriending white supremacists doesn't "free" Black people.
- Filmed over years, the film goes across the U.S. including conversations with Klan leaders and former members.

## Why It's Important and What Makes It Powerful-

- It challenges conventional ideas about how to confront racism not by shouting or protesting, but by listening and conversing.
- It raises hard questions: Is dialogue enough when it's with people who've done terrible harm?
- The documentary is a real-world example of bridge building but also doesn't shy away from how controversial or imperfect that bridge-building is.
- It's not just about the Klan it's also about generational and ideological divides in how to address systemic racism (Davis vs younger activists).
- The robes are a powerful symbol: each piece represents a person who, in some way, was changed or at least questioned their beliefs.

Starting in January for three months on Thursday evening at the local Tap Room in town, and with blessings of Faith and Development Team, is called Theology on Tap. It will be an opportunity for the community to meet at the Tap room to have a roundtable of open , honest theological, philosophical discussion(s) or anything in nature over a drink. Plus we will support our local establishment. If anything, it can be a listening session where people who are hurting or lonely, can be a living example of true bridge building.

Like I mentioned last week, the hard work of the lamb and wolf eating together can be exhausting. Dearly beloved, I do not have all the answers.

We cannot change each other's theological beliefs or persuasions. However, I know we can make a difference. With that charge, I believe whole heartedly, this church is a diamond in the rough. All of you, those online and folks yet to grace our presence in the future will enhance the vision and mission of this church. I feel so strongly and passionate about ministry because ministry is like this incredible story- which is from the book: "The Star Thrower" from THE UNEXPECTED UNIVERSE by Loren Eiseley. Copyright © 1968 by Loren Eiseley and renewed 1996 by John A. Eichman. It goes like this:

A young girl was walking along a beach upon thousands of starfish that had been washed up during a terrible storm. When she came to each starfish, she would pick it up and throw it back into the ocean. People watched her with amusement. She had been doing this for some time when a man approached her and said, "Little girl, why are you doing this? Look at this beach! You can't save all these starfish. You can't begin to make a difference!" The girl seemed crushed, suddenly deflated. But after a few moments, she bent down, picked up another starfish, and hurled it as far as she could into the ocean. Then she looked up at the man and replied, "Well, I made a difference for that one!"

The man looked at the girl inquisitively and thought about what she had done and said. Inspired, he joined the little girl in throwing starfish back into the sea. Soon others joined, and all the starfish were saved.

We are members, friends, associates/affiliates and people of the community- Let us love each other deeply, be faithful stewards, and offer hospitality without complaining. For our calling is to be engaged in belonging together as our German brothers and sisters say

-Zusammengehörigkeitsgefühl, or as the little girl reminds us, it will make a difference to that one!
